
Stephanie says, "I am delighted to be joining the Brecon Beacons National Park Authority for the next few months as the Transition Director. I'm being seconded from my permanent role as Head of Placemaking, Design and Specialist Advice for the National Trust where I have worked for the last 19 years; ever since, in fact, I left my role as the Head of Development Control for the Authority in 2003. I've lived with my family just to the south of the Beacons or within the Park for 32 years. There will be more change and challenges ahead but as we begin to emerge into the sunshine this summer, I'm confident the Brecon Beacons will have renewed meaning for people in a changed world. With the beauty and grandeur of the landscape offering real benefits to the health and wellbeing of communities in the Park, South Wales and beyond. I will be working closely with Authority staff, partners, stakeholders, residents and visitors for the benefit of this wonderful place and its communities."

Brecon is set to be **BUZZING!**

As Brecon town begins to emerge from the Covid restrictions Brecon Buzz has their sights set on positivity and enthusiasm.

There are a good number of new business opening in the town and there is a sense of excitement about the large Visit Brecon parasols that have been sourced by Brecon Town Council to enable an improved outdoor café culture. To add to the vibrant street scene Buzz members have also been working with The Chamber of Trade to put in a funding application to source 140 flowering hanging baskets to brighten up the high street and shop frontages.

The Buzz team are working on an indie guide for visitors which highlights twenty or so small businesses that are the best places for a coffee, a piece of local art and craft, a beautiful book or gift. The map includes the main town attractions. Much of the marketing copy for Brecon has been very outdated, Buzz has been in touch with colleagues at Powys and Visit Wales to refresh how the town is talked about on destination websites. The Brecon Story project is doing much to help build a great profile of the town's cultural assets and is involving many people from across the community – from 26 year olds to 80 year olds!





DRINKING IN THE VIEW

Visitors to Craig y nos Country Park can now delve into the stories that have shaped the surrounding landscape as they enjoy their al fresco lunch on the new interpretation tables.

Craig y nos Country Park is in the heart of the 'Forest Fawr UNESCO Global Geopark' and a great place to start exploration of this exciting destination. The tables are the latest development in the creation of a Geopark Discovery Point where you can find out more about our Geopark, what makes it special and where to go.

There are three tables to enjoy. You can journey from the Big Bang to present day at the timeline game table where you will encounter millions of years of adventure! If that's too exciting you can enjoy the stunning reconstruction illustrations explaining how the local hill, Cribarth, was reshaped by industry. The third table explores how people have explored, lived and worked in the Swansea Valley over time.

These are the first interpretation tables in the National Park and we hope they will prove popular however we would like to remind visitors to keep a 2m distance between each other whilst on the site.



GEOTOURS APP GOES LIVE!

A new Geotours app, featuring four walking tours in Fforest Fawr UNESCO Global Geopark, is now available for download from Google Play and the App Store. The App is being launched as part of European Geoparks Week celebrations, 22 May - 6 June, and users can choose from Cribarth, Garn Goch, Mynydd Illtud or Penwyllt before heading out on a self-led discovery tour of the Geopark.

Fforest Fawr Geopark, which covers the western half of the Brecon Beacons National Park, has 470 million years of stories to tell. Discover Cribarth and Penwyllt to see how exploitation of rocks has shaped the landscape, Garn Goch, an Iron Age Hill Fort and Mynydd Illtud, where you'll experience panoramic views of both the Geopark and National Park. Each tour was written by Alan Bowring, Geopark Development Officer, and there are plans to add more Geopark tours at a later date.

The Geotours, aimed at families with older children and adults looking for an introduction to the Geopark, lead you on walks that each take around 2-3 hours to complete. All four Fforest Fawr Geotours are available in Welsh too and feature spectacular aerial imagery, photography, and videos by Neil Mansfield of Landscapes Uncovered and Huw James of James Media.

The Geotours App was created using funding through Atlantic Geoparks, an EU Interreg project that Fforest Fawr participated in. The App has another 10 collections of Atlantic Area Geoparks tours which gives an opportunity for virtual visits and together they make up the

BRECON BEACONS NATIONAL PARK VISITOR CENTRE RE-OPENS

The Brecon Beacons National Park Visitor Centre is looking forward to reopening after the latest round of lockdowns. The Visitor Centre has taken the opportunity of lockdown to refurbish and improve the accessibility of its building, and has welcomed visitors again from Monday April 26th 2021.

Visitors will find the information centre, the craft shop, and the tea rooms will all be open from Monday the 26th. There will of course be full COVID-19 precautions in place. The tea rooms will be open for outdoor seating only, but we do have plenty of outdoor seating available, and we are awaiting the installation of a new covered area to enable visitors to sit outside, whatever the weather. Our toilet facilities will be open as usual.

Our Information Assistants are ready to welcome back visitors, and to give them all the advice they need to enjoy their stay within the Brecon Beacons National Park. The craft

shop will also be open. The craft shop run by Platform One Crafts cooperative will also be open with 12 local craftspeople selling and displaying their products within the shop.



The Information Centre will also have its new digital wall in operation, where visitors can see an interactive map of the National Park, along with other interpretive features.

The Centre will be open from 9.30am till 4.30pm seven days a week.

REVEALING THE SECRETS OF THE A470

As we slowly emerge from winter hibernation and the latest lockdown more and more of us will be exploring the Park. Before long we hope to reacquaint ourselves with favourite haunts and discover new ones, some of which can be accessed from the A470. As you venture on that familiar road trip south to Cardiff you may notice new interpretation panels along the way. There will shortly be 7 new panels at various locations telling those who stop off a little about the local heritage and landscape and a walk they can go on from that spot. These panels are the culmination of the Wales Way project which has also seen 4 poetry stones installed at other roadside locations and the kinetic Red Kite sculpture, which adorns the outside of the National Park Visitor Centre.



CRICKHOWELL RESOURCE & INFORMATION CENTRE

"Independent visitor information centres like CRiC (Crickhowell Resource & Information Centre) operating in the heart of a tourist area, Crickhowell and the Brecon Beacons have alongside other Tourism businesses been hit hard by local lockdowns and other restrictions. Once restrictions were gradually lifted, we were very grateful that the support of volunteers enabled us to reopen the Centre safely Monday to Saturday 10am till 4pm. Fulfilling various roles, the volunteers relish promoting all that Crickhowell has to offer, the enjoyment of the natural beauty of the Brecon Beacons and the creativity it inspires".

Celebrating its fifteenth anniversary this year, it offers a true taste of Wales and Crickhowell in a carefully selected range of guides, maps, books, cards and gifts.

The oriel CRiC gallery upstairs has resumed its exhibition programme with an exhibition that pays homage to the eternal joys of spring. Colour, light and variety all contribute to an uplifting exhibition which includes painting, printmaking, ceramics, sculpture and jewellery. The enjoyment and appeal of art and beautifully crafted items for the home has been more evident than ever since the re-opening of the gallery.

For those planning their staycations, CRiC has invested significantly in a new town website www.visitcrickhowell.wales which offers a wealth of information, as well as an online shop for art, books, guides and gifts – it's a great place for a bit of armchair exploring.

Following Government advice on reopening, social distancing measures are in place and numbers of visitors to the centre are limited at any given time.

NATIONAL LIDO OF WALES

The National Lido of Wales, Lido Ponty, opened on May 1st – book your swim online now.

This stunning attraction has three heated outdoor pools, offering lane swimming, casual swimming, an inflatable obstacle course and toddler splash pool in the heart of Ynysangharad War Memorial Park, Pontypridd.

Caffi Lido opens at the end of May, offering delicious food and drink to enjoy poolside or in the wider surroundings of the park, including salad boxes, gourmet burgers, afternoon teas, wood-fired pizza, smoothies, coffee and more.

Visitors are assured Covid-19 safety measures are in place. Fewer swimmers per session will be admitted, with cleaning taking place between sessions. Sun loungers will be poolside but, again, there are less of them to enable social distancing.

Lido Ponty has outdoor showers and outdoor changing booths that are actually the original ones from 1927! Guests will be allocated a changing room upon arrival to secure their safety.

Take time to enjoy your wider surroundings during your visit to Lido Ponty. Ynysangharad War Memorial Park is a Valleys Regional Gateway site, meaning it is a perfect "stepping-stone" for wider adventures.

See the sunken gardens and the statue commemorating Evan and James James, who composed the Welsh National Anthem as they strolled in the park.

Kids will love the huge industrial-themed Lido Play adventure playground and historic Pontypridd has great places to eat, drink and shop, as well as circular walks and heritage trails.

MEET AND GREET STAFF

The Brecon Beacons National Park Authority have secured additional Welsh Government funding for Waterfall Country and other areas across the National Park this year. Some of these funds will go towards contracting additional seasonal Meet and Greet staff on the ground. The extra Meet and Greet staff proved very successful last year. They will be working in Cwm Porth and Gwaun Hepste as well as out and about in the area ensuring that traffic is moving and visitors know where they can park responsibly.



CLOSURE OF CAR PARK

Car Park Closed Due to the high traffic and the issues at Pont Melin Fach car park in recent years, especially during 2020, Natural Resources Wales has taken the difficult decision to close this car park from Easter - September 2021. The narrow road has been damaged due to the high volume of traffic and residents on this road have had issues with accessing their properties. This is a temporary closure and will be reviewed at the end of the season.



15 MINUTE HERITAGE STEP BY STEP WALKS AT BRECON AND GOYTRE WHARF

Two new linear walks along the scenic  **Monmouthshire & Brecon Canal** start from Brecon basin and Goytre Wharf. They are available to download from the Canal and River Trust's website and from local information centres in Brecon, Abergavenny, the National Park and Goytre Wharf. The routes take in the stunning landscape, explore fascinating heritage and enjoy the sights and sounds of local wildlife. With the Monmouthshire & Brecon Canal adding the feelgood factor that being by the water can bring.

The bilingual trails have been designed to be followed in short measured sections, with the option of doing as little or as much as you like. You can go further on return visits as energy or time allows. The routes are surfaced for ease of use. There's also a chance to sample the trails in advance with the  **virtual video walks** available on the Trust's website.

During May and June, for eight weeks May 5th to 23rd June, you are welcome to join a gentle led walk every Wednesday, in the morning from Goytre Wharf or in the afternoon from Brecon Canal Basin. Prebooking is essential to manage group sizes – maximum 12 people. Eventbrite links below.

SMOOTHING THE WAY ALONG THE TOWPATH

The Canal and River Trust and Brecon Beacons National Park Authority have been working together to improve the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal towpath, with work completed in late March, just in time for the return of visitors. Funded by the Trust and organised by Brecon Beacons National Park Authority and the Trust, the resurfacing work was carried out by JPL Groundwork and Civil Engineering of Bulth Wells. It has resolved areas of puddling, erosion and narrowing over several sections between Brynich Lock and Llangynidr, totalling 9km. This has made it smoother and safer to walk or cycle in all weathers, with more surfaced width for passing. It is hoped to do further similar works later in 2021.

WATERFALLS, VISITOR SURVEY

Visitor Survey 2021 - 2022 When restrictions permit you may see staff from Strategic Research and Insight (SRI) out in the hotspots of Waterfall Country. Commissioned by the Ystradfellte and Penderyn Community Council and the Brecon Beacons National Park Authority, SRI are undertaking a survey that will be essential to get data on what improvements to the environment and facilities both visitors and residents feel are needed. This is a chance for you to have your say and the results of this will be the evidence needed for to go for the necessary funding to implement these changes. SRI will also be working with local businesses to encourage their customers to complete the online version of the survey either during or after their stay.

UNFORGETTABLE SUNSET EXPERIENCES

Early evening is a magical time of day. As the sun disappears beneath the horizon, the beauty of the changing sky can inspire wonder, awe and a sense of calm. Come to the park and experience dusk over epic mountains, glacial valleys and glacial lakes. Immerse yourself in nature as the scarlet skies turn indigo blue and finish each day with an unforgettable sunset experience.

There are so many remarkable backdrops in our park, offering some of the most dramatic sunset scenery you'll see anywhere in the world. We've picked out just a few to inspire you to come and stay, and create memories that will last a lifetime.

10. Blaen Onneu viewpoint

The views from here are so panoramic, it's no wonder the 'ash stream', has a flat summit area of about 450 metres, the elevation is eye level from a sea of clouds. As you descend below juxtaposes with the grandeur of the park.

We recommend that you stay close to the car to get to the top of the hill.

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4. Brecon Beacons National Park visitor centre

At 320 metres above sea level, right in the centre of the park, our visitor centre is an excellent location for watching the sun go down. It offers easy access to the countryside, great parking and plenty of space to find the best sunset Pan and Cam Du, so you can see what the

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3. Hay Bluff

Dominating the skyline above the town of Hay, the bluff is a natural wonder. It is a north-western scarp and you'll be to see the sun set over the Hay Valley. Hay Bluff can be quite windy and when the day is warm, the sun sets in a sea of gold light as dusk falls.

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7. Llangorse Lake

South Wales's largest natural lake provides an important habitat for water-based wildlife and is a marvellous place to explore as the day draws in. Keep your eyes peeled for a rich variety of birds, insects, otters, frogs, toads and newts, and as the sun sets you might even see a shark or eel!

There's a bird hide on the south shore and a crannog (a water-side dwelling) on the north side, both of which provide interesting photo opportunities. And if you're up for a legendary quest, go forth from the crannog in search of the sword in the stone. Whichever path is not a lead to the true King in quest of England.

The lake's bowl shape was carved out of sandstone by moving glaciers in the Ice Age, and is sometimes frozen over in winter, creating a distinctive icy blue food plot. High mountains to the east and All yr Eiger peak to the south provide breathtaking views at dusk. Coupled with reflections in the lake of illuminated skies, dazzling changing colours and the surrounding landscape, this is a truly spectacular sunset spot.

We are offering funding towards projects which develop and test ways of achieving a more sustainable way of living across the National Park. We can help develop and support projects which have social, environmental, economic and cultural benefits for the community.

Community Decarbonisation Fund/Green Energy Fund

Funding of up to £5,000 to install energy saving measures or renewable energy in your community facilities.



Heritage Grant Fund

We are offering individuals and community groups grants of up to £5,000 to undertake works to conserve and enhance the Heritage assets of our towns and villages. This is a conservation scheme, which seeks to promote the appropriate and timely repair of buildings or structures of architectural or historic importance, or improvements in interpretation of historic assets located within the towns and villages of the National Park.

Community Nature Recovery Fund

If you have a project idea that is about helping nature recover, we would love to hear about it and we may be able to provide the funding to take it forward. Thanks to the Local Nature Partnership we can provide 100% of the funding if necessary - anywhere from £50 to £500. We will need to know how it is helping nature recover or people within your community connect to nature, and ideally you will have volunteers.
